Week 5

Tuesday, February 7: Subjects and Verbs Quiz. Discussion of Writing Assignment #1

Thursday, February 9: In-class Writing Assignment #1—Reading Response. Before class, read the story on D2L and answer the questions.

Week 6

Tuesday, February 14: Discuss take home assignment (quiz grade): parts of speech, subjects, and verbs. Lecture on how to structure an essay.

Thursday, February 16: Instructor at conference—no class, take home assignment

Week 7

Tuesday, February 21: Take-home assignment due at the beginning of class. Discuss writing assignment #2—Process Essay: Writing Concisely and to Convey Meaning. Before class, read the short story and answer the questions posted on D2L.

Thursday, February 23: Sentence structure lecture.

Week 8

Tuesday, February 28: Sentence structure activities and continued lecture. Before class, complete the activities posted on D2L.

Thursday, March 2: Writing assignment #2 Peer review.

Week 9

Tuesday, March 7: Thesis statement lecture and activities.

Thursday, March 9: Writing Assignment #2 due at the beginning of class. Lecture on how to organize an essay around the main points.
